By tradition, The Episcopal Church offers Holy Communion to all baptized persons. If you are not baptized, but wish to receive, we invite you to participate fully in the opening part of the service, called the Ministry of the Word, hearing God's word and reflecting on your life, enabling you to come to the table for communion, if you so choose, with a heart prepared to receive. We hope that if you feel touched by the word and sacrament and wish to learn more about the life-giving power of the Spirit of the Risen Christ, you will contact the church office to inquire about participating in Holy Baptism.

Our Sunday School program (for children ages 2 years-grade 5) begins at 10am. Children are invited to join Miss Cassidy and our volunteers to hear a Bible story and enjoy fun and engaging activities related to that story. Children return to the church to join their families for Eucharist.

First Reading 1 Samuel 3:1-10

A Reading from the First Book of Samuel.

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

Psalm 139:1-5, 12-17

The response appointed for today is a portion of Psalm 139. We will read it responsively, breaking at the asterisk.

1 Lord, you have searched me out and known me; *

you know my sitting down and my rising up; you discern my thoughts from afar.

2 You trace my journeys and my resting-places * and are acquainted with all my ways.

3 Indeed, there is not a word on my lips, *

but you, O Lord, know it altogether.

4 You press upon me behind and before *

and lay your hand upon me.

5 Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; *

it is so high that I cannot attain to it.

12 For you yourself created my inmost parts; *

you knit me together in my mother's womb.

13 I will thank you because I am marvelously made; *

15 Your eyes beheld my limbs, yet unfinished in the womb;

all of them were written in your book; *

17 If I were to count them, they would be more in number than the sand; * to count them all, my life span would need to be like yours.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 6:12-20

A Reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. "Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.

We believe in one holy catholic¹ and apostolic² Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. Spiritual Communion

A spiritual communion is a personal devotional that anyone can pray at any time to express their desire to receive Holy Communion at that moment, but in which circumstances impede them from actually receiving Holy Communion.

Please join us in praying with our siblings in Christ who are with us online and receiving communion spiritually.

Dearest Lord Jesus, we believe that you are truly present in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. We love you above all things and long for you in our souls. Since we cannot all be together in our church today to receive the bread and wine made holy, we ask you to come spiritually into our hearts. Fill us with your light and nourish us all with your word and Spirit. Amen.

Invitation

This is the Banquet of the Lord.

It is made ready for those who love him and for those who want to love him more. So, come, you who have much faith and you who have little, you who have been here often and you who have not been here long, you who have tried to follow and you who fear you have failed.

Come, because it is the Lord who invites you.

It is his will that those who want him should meet him in his holy way.

For in-person worshipers: Wherever you are in your journey of faith, you are welcome at communion. Our custom is to stand or kneel at the altar rail to receive the Eucharist. If you are unable to come forward but would like to receive, please let an usher know and we will bring communion to you.

The Common Cup will be offered on the right side of the altar rail. Intinction (dipping) will be offered on the left (Loma Vista) side.

Regardless of which side you are sitting on, when you come forward, please go to whichever side is offering the wine in the way you prefer to receive it.

Those receiving by intinction are asked to help themselves to a small paper cup.

Please tell the priest if you prefer a gluten-free wafer.

You may also choose to return to your seat without receiving the wine.

Be assured that it is a sufficient experience of communion.

If you'd like to come forward but would prefer not to receive, please cross your arms over your chest and the priest will offer you a blessing.





Why have an Annual Meeting?

To conduct the business of the church.

Who needs to attend?

All members of the church are encouraged to attend. We need enough members in attendance so that we will have a **quorum of 50 members**.

What happens at the Annual Meeting?

We vote for new Vestry members and elect our delegates to Diocesan Convention. We receive reports from the groups and committees of the church and review our finances and the budget for the coming year.

Who can Vote at this Meeting?

Though everyone is encouraged to attend the Annual Meeting, in order to vote, one must be a qualified elector. According to the Constitution and Canons of the Church in the Diocese of Los Angeles, Canon IV 4.04 The following shall be qualified electors: Any person sixteen years of age or over and attendant upon the services of the Parish, who for the previous twelve (12) months have been registered upon the Parish Rolls as a baptized communicant in good standing of that parish;

the list of qualified electors shall be published by the Vestry no less than 30 days prior to any special or annual meeting of the Parish.

Each nominee must be meet the qualifications and be willing to serve.

Delegates to Convention

The Diocese of Los Angeles meets once a year for the Diocesan Convention. The number of delegates is determined by size of the church. St. Paul's gets four delegates. Our clergy also get voice and vote at convention.

Our time together during convention is woven into a context of worship and prayer following a theme. In 2023 that theme was *Love in Action: For Healing, Housing & Hope.* This was a hybrid convention with some delegates attending in-person and others attending online. Over 700 hundred attended in all.

While gathered as the people of God in the Diocese of Los Angeles, we do the work of the church electing officers and representatives to various Diocesan positions and to General Convention. We also hear wonderful speakers and are presented with lots of updates and information about the broader church. To top it all off, there's a great exhibit hall to peruse, lots of interesting people to meet and a great time to be had.

Diocesan Convention 2024 will be hosted at the Riverside Convention Center on Friday and Saturday, November 9 and 10, 2024.

We are looking for nominations for the position of Delegate to Convention. Each nominee must be a member of the church and be willing to attend convention. Typically, delegates stay in a hotel for one or two nights that weekend at their own cost. Funds are available from the Rector's Discretionary Fund for anyone for whom that presents a financial burden.

Vestry

St. Paul's Vestry is made up of 12 members plus the Rector; each member is elected to serve a 3-year term and 4 members of the Vestry retire each year. So, we will be thanking 4 members for their service and electing 4 to replace them.

Slate of Nominees - Each year, a Nominating Committee, made up of each of the retiring Vestry Members, the Senior Warden, and the Rector. Together, they recruit qualified members to run for a position on the vestry. That Slate of Nominees is presented for election.

We will have a wonderful Slate of Nominees for Vestry Positions and don't need any further volunteers. However, nominations may be submitted by any member of the congregation following the procedure described below.

Requirements to Serve on the Vestry

- A. **Vestry Members must meet same requirements as qualified electors** Any person sixteen years of age or over and attendant upon the services of the Parish, who for the previous twelve (12) months shall have been registered upon the parish rolls as a baptized communicant in good standing of that parish
- B. **And be able to carry out the responsibilities of a Vestry Member –** Intend to serve the entire three-year term to which they are elected
 - Be a pledged or regular contributor to the support of the Parish
 - Attend monthly meetings (currently they are on the fourth Wednesday of each month from 6:30-8:30 pm)
 - Attend additional meetings and retreats as needed
 - Attend subcommittee meetings which vary as to day and time
 - Oversee and communicate regularly with the committees you represent to the Vestry.
- C. Retiring vestry members must wait one year before they can run for the Vestry again unless they were originally called to replace someone and served a term of 2 years or less.
 - Paid Staff at St. Paul's and their spouses may not serve on the Vestry [St. Paul's Bylaws Article IV. Section 2. ... Salaried employees of the corporation and their spouses are deemed ineligible for election to the Vestry.]

To make a nomination:

- 1. Be sure the person being nominated (yourself or another) is qualified.
- 2. Be sure the person being nominated (yourself or another) is willing to serve.
